LT COL John (Jack) H. Adams speaks about African American History

Jack is originally from Washington, D.C. and his schooling was predominantly in D.C.. In 1955, Jack graduated from Howard University with BA in Accounting and simultaneously was commissioned a 2nd Lt. in the United States Air Force under the ROTC program.

He began active duty in July 1956 and entered into Flight Navigator Training. He also received an MBA from the University of Utah in 1968. His last assignment was OSAN AIR BASE, KOREA. He retired from the USAF after 21 years of active duty in 1976. After

retirement, he worked for the KC EPA, the U.S. Treasury in KC and was eventually promoted to Regional Director as a GS-15, the highest pay grade for a Federal employee. In this position, he was responsible for monthly disbursements in excess of \$18 Billion dollars to numerous government agencies both domestic and abroad.

Of significance, on October 26, 1999, Jack was appointed to the coveted U.S. Government status of a SES (Senior Executive Service), which is the equivalence of position of status and pay of a General officer in the military and each have their own flag. He was formally appointed by a Federal Judge and the Director



Biggest influence in George Washington's life

George Washington was born Feb. 22, 1732. He was unanimously chosen as the army's commander-in-chief, unanimously chosen as president of the Constitutional Convention, and unanimously chosen as the first U.S. president. As general, Washington acknowledged God after victories throughout the Revolution and as president thanked God for the Constitution, Oct. 3, 1789: "Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the Providence of Almighty God ... I do recommend ... rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks, for ... the favorable interpositions of His Providence ... we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war ... for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government."Washington was Anglican, and after the Revolution, Episcopalian.

His great-great-grandfather, Rev. Lawrence Washington, was an Anglican minister in Essex, England.his position when the Puritans won the

English Civil War.

George Washington's great-grandfather, John Washington, immigrated to Virginia and became a planter, politician, and militia leader. A local Anglican church was renamed "Washington" in honor of John Washington.

When he died, John Washington left to the church a tablet with the Ten Commandments, on which he inscribed: "Being heartily sorry from the bottome of my hart for my sins past, most humbly desiring forgiveness of the same from the Almighty God (my Saviour) and Redeemer, in whom and by the merits of Jesus Christ, I trust and believe assuredly to be saved, and to have full remission and forgiveness of all my sins."

George Washington's grandfather, Lawrence, was Anglican. George Washington's father, Augustine, served as a vestryman in the Anglican Truro Parish. George Washington also became vestryman in Truro Parish, and was godfather in baptism to a niece and several nephews.
