STEVE ROTKOFF TO SPEAK ABOUT HIS EXPERIENCES AS A HIGH LEVEL INTELLIGENCE OFFICER DURING IRAQ AND AFGHANISTAN WARS



Steve Rotkoff has served in a wide variety of leadership and planning positions while a uniformed soldier and after retiring from the military. Among his more notable assignments were lead intelligence planner for ground attack options in Kosovo, chief author of a key Army doctrinal manual 2001 FM 3-0, command of an Army Brigade of 2000 soldiers and Deputy Combined Forces Land Component Commander G-2 for all

intelligence production for ground forces entering Iraq in 2003. After retirement, Mr. Rotkoff served as the lead for decision making transformation efforts for the Army. He was the first instructor and curriculum developer for the Army's critical and creative thinking and group-think mitigation program. During his leadership of this program, among other achievements, he facilitated six red teams for the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs which included a counter ISIS strategy with a focus on countering Chinese military capabilities and he led the effort to write the Applied Critical Thinking Handbook for red teaming which is considered the industry standard. Mr. Rotkoff was also selected by LTG (Ret)) Honore' to serve as the in-house red teamer for the Jan 6th Task Force stood up by Speaker Pelosi in late Jan 2021 to look at ways to better secure the Capitol and the House members. Mr. Rotkoff recently published a book with his sister, Leslie Neal-Boylan, entitled "Innovative Decision Making in Heath Care". This is a red team primer using case studies from the many years of Mr. Rotkoff assisting his sister as she applied red teaming as a leader in both clinical and academic nursing. Since 2017, Mr. Rotkoff has been an independent contractor in the civilian sector serving as both an educator and facilitator of red team tools and methods for improved decision making. He is a 1977 graduate of West Point and holds a number of post graduate degrees.

Chapter Finances

The following is a summary of our Chapter's finances as of the end of 2022. All values are approximations and are rounded:

Checking account used for operating expenses	\$8273
Scholarship account	\$7002
Family Assistance Program (FAP) account	\$750
Certificate of Deposit	\$10362
Certificate of Deposit	\$6928
Auxiliary account	\$6698

Our main source of income is from member dues which was \$2975 from 119 members during 2022. A much smaller amount comes from our Luncheon raffle.

Our main expenses are for dues and fund raising mailings, speaker stipends, website service, contribution to Chapter social events and General Liability Insurance. Luncheon meal expenses are a pass through with funds collected going directly to DAV staff for food cost, service and tips.
